## Cook Park using reclaimed water

In an effort to reduce demand on Tigard's domestic water supply, the parks division constructed a reclaimed water irrigation system in the soccer and baseball fields.

Reclaimed water is waste water that is treated and reused for non-domestic use. The reclaimed water used at Cook Park is supplied by Clean Water Services from their Durham facility located near the park. The water is transported in a separate irrigation line that is only used to water the sports fields and

adjacent shrub beds. Using reclaimed water provides Cook Park with a steady supply of water throughout the year even during droughts when domestic water restrictions are in place. Last year alone the use of reclaimed water in

Cook Park saved Tigard 25.4 million gallons of domestic water for use elsewhere.

## Addressing Growth – City Council Goal 3

This goal has five distinct components: Revise Comprehensive Plan for Tigard and if funded, for Bull Mountain; Metro – seek changes; Identify and Acquire Parks and Open Space; Review Growth of Expenditures and Revenue; and Graphic Identity (Branding) – signage, logo, stationary. This article provides a brief update on efforts to identify and acquire parks and open space.

The City Council is considering adoption of a resolution setting forth certain principles directed at how the City will approach purchasing park and open space property. The proposed principles are:

- evaluate all park and open space donation requests and direct staff to submit a recommendation to the City Council for each donation request
- prioritize the search and evaluation of future park sites to those areas identified as currently underserved. Underserved is defined in the city's adopted Park Master Plan as areas not within ½ mile of a neighborhood park
- attempt to use city funds/SDCs/grants/etc. for parkland purchases inside the city limits, and parks SDC revenue/grants/etc. for purchases of land outside the city limits, but within the UGB or UGB expansion areas
- look to serve those areas which will become park deficient over time
- look to purchase or obtain parcels of some size as compared to multiple small parcels if possible
- authorize the evaluation and acquisition of suitable parcels outside the city limits, and
- consider land banking adequate lands for future development.

The Park and Recreation Advisory Board recommended to Council that \$2,144,025 be allocated for land acquisition in FY 05-06. The amount allocated is scheduled to be reviewed by City Council as part of the budget approval process on June 14.

## West Nile Virus monitoring efforts begin

The City of Tigard, in partnership with Washington County, has begun this year's West Nile Virus Monitoring Program. In an effort to protect our community and as part of a regional response plan, Tigard will:

- collect adult mosquitoes and mosquito larvae for evaluation,
- provide educational materials for local residents with concerns, and
- treat all sumped city catch basins with mosquito larvicides.



West Nile Virus occurs naturally in birds. Mosquitoes feed on infected birds and then transmit the virus to humans, birds and horses. This virus does not impact most people, with only about 20% of those bitten by infected mosquitoes developing symptoms and less than 1% becoming seriously ill.

To lower your risk of infection take, precautions to avoid mosquito bites, control breeding sites by eliminating standing water, and maintaining outdoor ponds and pools.

### Bonita Park gets a new look

The restoration of the Fanno Creek riparian zone in Bonita Park is complete thanks to the dedication of volunteers and city staff who participated in multiple tree planting events.

Last year city staff launched the restoration project with the clearing of 3.5 acres of non-native species along the stream's bank and prepared the site for the re-vegetation phase of the project. Tigard partnered with Friends of Trees who organized volunteers for the events. The native plants were purchased with stormwater management funds (SWM). Nearly four hundred adult and youth volunteers helped plant nearly 1,300 native trees and shrubs.

The commitment and dedication of those who participated is greatly appreciated and will benefit the community for years to come.

## Your Street Maintenance Fee dollars at work

City Council approved a Street Maintenance Fee in November 2003. The fee went into effect April 2004. Your Street Maintenance Fee dollars are working on the PMMP (Pavement Major Maintenance Program) Phase 2 which begins in May and ends July 2005. Streets scheduled for maintenance, primarily street overlays, are:



- **72nd Avenue (Fir Loop to Highway 217 overcross)** - 72nd Ave. including the highway on/off ramps will be CLOSED two separate evenings between 8 p.m. and 5 a.m., weather permitting. Exact dates will be posted 48 hours in advance.
- **121<sup>st</sup> Avenue (Ann Place to Springwood Drive)** and
- **Main/Commercial Street (intersection)** - No closures are expected; however, intermittent lane closures may cause delays up to 20 minutes.

## Improve 99W - City Council Goal 2

- The widening of the **McDonald Street/Hwy. 99W** intersection to add a dedicated right-turn lane on McDonald, a dedicated through lane across 99W to Gaarde Street, and an extended left-turn lane on McDonald will be under construction during the next two months.
- An analysis to determine the scope of work for improvements to the **Hall Blvd/Hwy. 99W** intersection is expected to be completed by the end of May 2005. Washington County representatives are tentatively scheduled to provide a project status briefing to City Council at the June 21, 2005 workshop meeting. The intersection project is funded through Washington County's MSTIP 3 (Major Streets Transportation Improvement Program). Once the project scope has been defined, engineering design work will begin. Construction is expected to begin in the fall of 2006.
- The city submitted a pre-application for a Transportation Growth Management (TGM) grant to perform a **Hwy. 99W Corridor Improvement and Management Study**. The Oregon Department of Transportation reviewed the pre-application and indicated that the project should be a strong candidate for grant approval. The city is now preparing the actual grant application. The products of the study are a plan for management of the corridor and a package of projects that can be implemented over a period of years as funding sources are identified and designated for these projects. Assuming the city is successful in obtaining the grant, the study is expected to begin in late 2005 and take six to eight months to complete.
- The corridor study to determine the best alignment for the **Walnut Street extension** from Hwy. 99W, through downtown Tigard, to Hunziker Street awaits the completion and recommendations from the Downtown Improvement Plan.
- A project to determine how to improve the **Main St./Greenburg Rd./Hwy. 99W** intersection is included in the proposed FY 2005-06 Capital Improvement Program. The results of the study should provide direction on the best way to alleviate congestion and improve traffic flow at this intersection.

## Did you know?

The Tigard Public Library's mission statement is: The Tigard Public Library serves the community by promoting reading and providing access to materials in all formats to meet residents' informational, cultural, education and recreational needs. The library fosters lifelong learning and provides an array of programs and services to encourage the development of well-rounded citizens.

- Forty people fill a combination of full and part-time positions to staff the library and provide service to citizens.
- If all the books and audio-visual materials added to the library collection in 2004 were piled one on top of another, they would reach 1,086 feet, thirty feet higher than the observation deck of the Empire State Building.
- During 2004, over 665,000 books and audio-visual materials were checked out. That is over 166 tons of books, videos, DVDs, CDs and cassettes – the same weight as 28 African elephants!
- Librarians answered over 62,000 questions in 2004.
- 70,747 items were checked out of the library in March 2005 - 5,000 more items than the record set in January 2005.





## Revitalize Downtown - City Council Goal 1

Over the last year, more than 1,200 citizens have been involved in creating Tigard's Downtown Improvement Plan? The plan is the result of the work of the Downtown Task Force and citizens who took time out of their busy schedules to participate in this exciting process.

To make this the community's plan, the task force sought your comments and:

- Received almost 600 surveys (summer 2004)
- During October, 2004 and March/April, 2005, spoke with 488 people during 48 Community Dialogs, small-group meetings throughout the city to discuss and get comments on the plan.
- Held additional events: a December Workshop, where participants rolled up their sleeves and worked on the Plan details; the well-attended April 23 Open House, where over 100 citizens spent their morning learning and commenting about the plan; a meeting with Ash Ave. neighbors; and monthly Task Force meetings open to the public.
- Created an interested parties list (both a mailing list and by e-mail) that notifies you about upcoming meetings and events.

This is the community's plan, and it is a blueprint for the future. To build this plan and make it happen, the task force needs you. There will be advisory groups forming in the summer to address funding sources, land use regulations, and building projects. ## Committee for Citizen Involvement

In addition to Council, the City of Tigard's governmental structure includes a wide variety (10 at present) of boards, committees, and commissions. These are advisory to the City Council and assist in formulating policy and making decisions. The newest of these advisory bodies, the Committee for Citizen Involvement (CCI), is also one of the oldest. Originally established in 1975, the CCI was reactivated by City Council in 2004 and expanded in 2005, when Council acted to broaden the CCI membership to include representatives from the city's main boards and committees.

The present CCI is the city's primary public involvement and communication organization. Its purpose is to evaluate all city communications and public involvement activities and to suggest how these can be improved. The current committee consists of eight members. They include Sue Carver, Basil Christopher, Beverly Froude, Stacie Yost, Robert Cancelosi, Teddi Duling, Sue Kasson, and Bill Scheiderich.

Some of the recent citizen involvement and communication activities evaluated by the CCI include the proposed new Neighborhood Program, the city web page, and Goal 5 natural resource protection outreach. The CCI will assist with the development of the upcoming Comprehensive Plan update and in determining how best to engage the community in that process.

The CCI meets bi-monthly. All meetings are open to the public. ## Tree City USA

For the fourth year in a row Tigard has been named a Tree City USA by the National Arbor Day Foundation. The Tree City USA designation honors Tigard's commitment to its community forest. In order to become a Tree City USA, Tigard had to establish the following:

- A tree board or department;
- A tree care ordinance;
- A comprehensive community forestry program; and
- An Arbor Day observance.
