Tigard City Council President John Goodhouse Appointed to Serve on National League of Cities' Transportation and Infrastructure Services Committee

WASHINGTON — **John Goodhouse, City Council President from Tigard, OR** has been appointed to the [National League of Cities](#) (NLC) 2019 [Transportation and Infrastructure Services](#) (TIS) federal advocacy committee.
